
Celebrating 50!

DEBATING INCORPORATION

2017 marks the 50th Anniversary of the City of Warrenville's incorporation. After 134 years as a community, in 1967 Warrenville voted YES to incorporate. The long and heated debate about incorporation officially began in 1927 when the first petition for incorporation was filed. Despite enthusiasm in the community and 63 citizens signing the petition, when the vote was held at Sleep Store on October 29, only 56 people out of 270 voted in favor of incorporation. Warrenville was a small community and the majority of its residents liked the town the way it was; they saw no need to have an official government taxing them and limiting what they could do with their property.

No municipal structure over residents also meant no governing body over businesses. By the 1950s, businesses were making a move to occupy more of the town, especially on the newly expanded Butterfield Road. When residents petitioned the County against the rezoning, they found the County Board had little sympathy for their concerns and soon the corner at Batavia Road and Butterfield was occupied by the Town and Country Lounge, which eventually became the Carousel Lounge and Restaurant.

The second petition to incorporate came in 1954 right at the start of another battle in town, this time one to keep the Elmhurst Chicago Stone Company out of the community. Despite residents concern about the Stone Company coming into town, they were not ready to vote for incorporation. A vote on May 1, 1954, and December

28, 1957, lost by big margins. Warrenville was not ready to become a city.

After the 1957 vote, the debate, which had divided many in town, was quiet for three years and no one was looking to reignite the fight. There was only one thing that could get Warrenville residents to revisit the angry battle-FROGS! A "lastditch fight with a belching army of frogs" headlined led a report in the Chicago Tribune calling for the incorporation of Warrenville as the only solution to a strange new problem. Flooding in 1961 in the Ray subdivision had left residents in the area with an army of belching frogs. After seeking the help of the County and the State, residents filed a petition to incorporate in the hopes that a local government would have to provide more help to Warrenville residents. However when a court struct down the petition, the impending vote disappeared with the frog! It would take four more petitions until there was a successful vote for incorporation. 
